# **Multi-annual planning**

### **DEMAND SIDE**

- Development programmes (national, regional, international)
  - changes with time
- User demand
  - better statistical data
  - more breadth and more depth

### **SUPPLY SIDE**

- Building capacity to respond to demand
  - a slow, steady process, constrained by resources
- Comparability over time to be assured
- Census and survey programmes spread over several years

# **Multi-annual planning**

### **SUPPLY SIDE (cont'd)**

- Developing a new operation usually more than a year
- Nearly 100 NSDS have been implemented since 2004
- Data Revolution and the Post-2015 development agenda to be approved/adopted soon
- Now until September 2015: finding, developing and testing possible indicators

## **Multi-annual planning**

#### **Important to consider:**

- Readiness of National Statistical Systems by 2016?
- Start adjusting NSDS to the Post-2015 agenda
  - 2016-2020 first round

- Necessary elements for designing, implementing and managing the National Strategy for the Development of Statistics (NSDS) process - present in existing guidelines.
- Structure of old guidelines (organised in 10 chapters) not always easy to handle
  - mainly theoretical
  - not always illustrated by concrete examples or good practices

- Need for a more user-friendly and flexible tool:
  - a living web version
  - encyclopaedia of statistical development enriched with PARIS21 members' experience and knowledge across regions
- Link systematically each process with existing norms, tools and good practices
- Clearly differentiate between NSDS design and NSDS implementation
- Distinguish permanent activities vs. sequenced steps

- Sharing of best practices
  - nearly 100 NSDS have been implemented since 2004
- Adapting to changing context
  - countries going through different initiatives (e.g., Heavily Indebted Poor Countries and Managing for Development Results);
  - use of practical tools for strategic planning, risk management, progress monitoring, and outcome evaluation;
  - MDGs, sustainable development goals, new statistical norms and standards/frameworks (e.g., GDDS, SDDS, SNA 2008, SEEA)

- To address specific issues and concerns
  - post crisis states
  - small island developing states
  - federal states
  - regional approach to statistical development
  - sectoral statistics

### **Future updates**

### • Establish an NSDS 2.0 Guidelines Reference Group

- Membership: country experts from across regions, regional organisations and consultants
- Meet yearly on an ad hoc basis prior to P21 Board
- Updates in the NSDS 2.0 Guidelines
  - Based on comments of stakeholders (e.g., NSOs)
  - Modifications approved by the Reference Group
- Changes in the guidelines will be presented each year during PARIS21 Annual Board Meeting

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
