UNSD activities

- UNSD capacity development activities have recently focused on:
 - Support of institutional setup and functioning of NSOs and NSSs
 - Support in specific statistical domains
 - Support to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic
 - Support to maintain statistical production activities under new conditions / restrictions
 - Support not only focused on SDG-related areas

How are training activities changing? (1)

- New forms
 - Online training courses
 - Not as result of COVID alone
 - Advances in underlying technology and access
 - UNSD in process of setting up e-learning platform
 - Various methods of e-learning are employed
 - Not appropriate for all trainings
 - Require a change in training styles
 - No simple transfer of in-person to online training
 - UNSD work on best practices to facilitate common approach

How are training activities changing? (2)

- New forms Caution
 - many current online activities are not a full replacement of traditional activities (e.g. for a one-week workshop)
 - easier for one-directional activities
 - Activities requiring interaction become difficult
 - Positive: large audience
 - Negative: reduced feedback and discussion
 - technical difficulties in many areas

How are training activities changing? (3)

- New topics
 - Statistics production in new environment
 - E.g. alternatives to traditional in-person data collection
 - New data sources
 - Admin data
 - Several projects underway to establish guidelines
 - Big data
 - Many projects on specific topics and general training programmes

How are training activities changing? (4)

- New approaches
 - How do we develop training courses?
 - For big data (and other fields):
 - Development of competency frameworks
 - Assessment via Maturity matrices
 - Identification of skill gaps
 - Deriving of training needs
 - Consistent approach to define course parameters
 - Learning objectives, prerequisites etc.
- (training previously supply-driven, now consider more the demand)

Handbook (1)

- New data requirements to monitor the 2030
 Agenda for Sustainable Development and related regional and national development plans
- Statistical offices need to review their institutional, organizational and technical processes
 - in conformity with the Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics
- Handbook on Statistical Organization has always been a tool for this

Handbook (2)

- Since 1954, the primary objective of the Handbook has been to guide chief statisticians and senior managers of statistical organizations in developing and maintaining statistical capacity that is fit for purpose
 - Current (third) edition was issued in 2003
- New: Name changed from Handbook of Statistical Organization to Handbook on Management and Organization of National Statistical Systems

Handbook (3)

- Like previous editions, the Handbook, is not intended to be followed in a prescriptive manner
 - situation in each country is unique
 - usefulness of the guidance therefore depends on local circumstances
- Instead, it provides descriptive information to guide and inform statistical organizations on critical issues and topics, including those that are new and emerging
 - e.g. measuring and cushioning the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic (as a special form of crisis management)

Handbook (4)

• Process:

- Core drafting team managed by the Statistics Division
- Advisory group to guide the drafting process and ensure that an inclusive approach is taken
 - Selected to take advantage of existing statistical networks and initiatives at the regional and global levels
 - from the region: Mongolia, Philippines, ADB, ESCAP
- Progress regularly reviewed by the UN Statistical Commission

Handbook (5)

- The new Handbook consists of sixteen chapters: an introduction, an overview and fourteen substantive topic-oriented chapters with several annexes
 - This outline was informed by a full review of the current edition of the Handbook, a survey conducted on the needs of current chief statisticians as well as other consultations

Handbook (7)

• Next steps:

- Handbook is intended to be a living document
- Will be updated at regular intervals to address common challenges and grasp innovative solutions
 - Example: IT-related tools and methods change quickly
- An interactive web version is being developed
 - Accommodates country examples
- A series of Thematic Conferences also assists in this process of keeping the Handbook up-to-date

Thematic Conferences (1)

- To make the consultation process more inclusive, a series of regional thematic conferences on managing a statistical organization in times of change is being organized
 - organized at the regional and sub-regional levels for participants to consider recent institutional, organizational and technical developments addressing prospective challenges and opportunities
 - to share the purpose and contents of the new Handbook to a wider audience of chief statisticians, senior managers of statistical organizations and policymakers
 - also conducted to better understand and prioritize emerging needs of statistical organizations to adapt and develop, as well as to exchange experiences and recent initiatives
 - To gather success stories to illustrate the recommendations in the Handbook

Thematic Conferences (2)

- Structured around four main themes covering all substantive chapters of the Handbook
 - 1. Strengthening the institutional and organizational frameworks of national statistical systems
 - 2. Securing the quality of statistical information and improving data coherence through statistical analysis and analytical frameworks
 - 3. Supporting the transformation of statistical production processes, from data collection to dissemination, in the context of the digital and technological revolution
 - 4. Mobilizing and securing adequate resources and infrastructure and promoting regional and global cooperation for the development of national statistical capacity
 - (linked to chapters and strategic areas of the CTGAP)

Thematic Conferences (3)

- A series of eight regional thematic conferences was planned, including three for the region:
 - one for Asia (excl. Central Asia)
 - one for Pacific Island countries
 - one for Central Asian countries (as part of the SE-EECCA group)
- Due to COVID-19 only the conference for Asian Countries could be completed
- The other two are on hold until in-person meetings are possible again
